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MONTH AT GLANCE

During the month of December, the Neighborhood Coyote Program continued to document reports and share relevant information to residents who reported coyote activity in their neighborhoods.

It is normal to see an increase in coyote activity during winter months, as this is when pups born in late spring begin to disperse from their dens. Remember, coyotes may not immediately flee when they see humans, but oftentimes they will maintain their distance. Stay vigilant, especially for coyotes that express bold or aggressive behavior. These are signs of a habituated coyote, which can occur when coyotes are intentionally and/or unintentionally fed by humans. Food attractants in our neighborhoods, such as pet food and unsealed trash cans, are major contributors to this problem. Please continue doing your part to reduce attractants and prevent coyote habituation.


REPORT MAP
