MONTH AT Glance

During the month of August, the Neighborhood Coyote Program continued to document reports and share relevant information to residents who reported coyote activity in their neighborhoods. MONTHLY TOTALS AND RESPONSE LEVELS

Within the City of Rosemead, there were 7 reports of coyote interactions for the month of August. Four reports were classified as Response Level 1. Response Level 1 includes hearing or seeing coyotes. One report was classified as Response Level 2. Response Level 2 includes coyotes entering a yard with or without pets present. Two reports were classified as Response Level 3. Response Level 3 includes entering a yard and injuring or killing an attended or unattended pet. There were 8 coyotes reportedly seen in the City of Rosemead. We reviewed all reports made online via Coyote Cacher, the Neighborhood Coyote reporting form, and by phone


